## Never see a need without doing something about it.

(St Mary of the Cross Mackillop - 1871)

Last weekend we celebrated the Feast Day of St Mary of the Cross Mackillop, Australia's first and only Saint. She was canonised in Rome, 17 October 2010, nearly one hundred years after her death on August 8, 1909.


Mary Mackillop was born on Brunswick Street, Fitzroy, Melbourne in 1842, not far from St Patrick's Cathedral where she was baptised. Her parents were Scottish immigrants who provided a loving home to Mary and her seven siblings. They were not a wealthy family, and from a young age Mary was involved in supporting her family. This led to her awareness of the lack of education and medical care amongst the Catholic families around her. She dreamed of addressing this injustice which became a reality when at 24 years of age she opened her first primary school in South Australia. A year later she took religious vows and by 1869, two years later, 60 sisters had joined her.

This story is very similar to that of our own Blessed Edmund Rice. He also saw a great need amongst poor children and worked hard to right this social inequality.

Mary Mackillop, like Edmund centered their lives on God. This may be unfashionable these days however there are many in our community who see a need and respond. Donating their time, money, resources, and compassion to those living on the margins of our society.

In January 1995 Pope John Paul II, while in Australia, celebrated the beatification of Mother Mary MacKillop, the first Australian formally declared by the Catholic Church. He said, 'Think

of Mother Mary MacKillop and learn from her to be a gift of love and compassion to one another, for all Australians and for the world'. There are many in our community who are this gift of love and compassion, can you name one?





# Wellbeing

#### Resilience

Last week, when the students were happily engaged in face to face learning, they were able to complete their on-line Resilience Survey for 2021. The survey was sponsored by the City of Stonnington who partnered with Resilient Youth Australia, who designed it.

This survey is delivered to hundreds of thousands of students Australia wide, every two years. It looks to see how young people feel about themselves, school, home and their future.

Once complete, Resilient Youth Australia prepares a comprehensive report on how resilient our student cohort is and offers comparisons on how they were feeling in 2017, 2019 and 2021.

According to Resilient Youth Australia, resilience is based on three aspects: whether young people feel connected, protected and respected. To have all three, we can say young people are resilient.

To feel **connected**, young people need to feel they have the love and support of their family, have adults they can talk to and who listen, have adults who set a good example, have teachers who encourage them and when young people feel they are doing as well as others. These resilient young people would also spend time with friends and be able to talk about things when they are upset.

To feel **protected**, young people would need to feel safe at school and home, have at least 8 hours sleep, keep physically fit, not be too self-critical, have an interest in doing things they enjoy, try hard at school, and believe that school has clear rules that are fairly enforced.

To feel **respected**, young people would need to feel good about themselves, feel they can trust others and are trustworthy themselves, take responsibility for their actions, help others, make valuable contributions, be safe and keep others safe.

The 2021 Resilience Survey Report should be available for our school community near the end of the year. The survey results will be published in a later newsletter, once known.


We played two games, one against Mentone Girls Grammar and the other against Siena.

## **Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund**

#### 2021 Applications Close 3 August 2021

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Funding (CSEF) is a \$225 annual payment to schools that can be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of eligible students.

To qualify for the CSEF your family must satisfy the following criteria or be an eligible beneficiary of one of the following cards:

- Veterans Affairs Gold Card
- Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC)
- Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, or
- be a temporary foster parent, or
- the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card).
- \* A special consideration eligibility category also exists.

The CSEF is paid directly to St Mary's College and will be credited against your Fee Account at St Mary's College to contribute towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child. If you believe that you may be eligible for the CSEF, please complete and return the CSEF Application Form, which is available through the above link.

Please note that 25 June 2021 is the last date that St Mary's College can lodge an Application Form on your behalf for the current year.

#### 2021 Fee Accounts

All 2021 Fee Accounts were due and payable by 31 March 2021, unless an approved Payment Plan was in place by this date. All families wishing to enter a Payment Plan arrangement should have already completed, signed and lodged a 2021 Fee Payment Agreement Form with the Finance Office. If you have not done so, please lodge the relevant documentation as soon as possible.

All payment arrangements must be finalised by 31 October 2021.
