From the Principal

On Tuesday of this week, we were delighted to welcome the Archbishop of Melbourne to our school for the first time, to lead us in our inaugural St Mary's College Mass. Archbishop Peter Comensoli and our College Chaplain, Fr. Jerome Santamaria celebrated the Mass in Logue Hall at the Edmund Rice Campus. The presence of Archbishop Peter made a special day even more so, and his "off script" conversation and final Blessing with the Year 12 and Year 7 students was such a highlight.

The Mass was the central feature of a day of acknowledgement and celebration of those who have come before us, those women and men who left their homes in the nineteenth century with little expectation of ever seeing them again, having heard the call from Fr James Corbett "from the ends of the earth" to establish the beginnings of our Catholic Education precinct.

During the Mass we acknowledged the years both the Presentation Sisters and the Christian Brothers, inspired by both Blessed Edmund Rice and the Venerable Nano Nagle, have contributed in such an extraordinary way to our Church community, inspiring the hearts and minds of generations of young women and men. As we reimagine our school, we proudly acknowledge our past but must now contemplate a future as St Mary's College, a Co-Educational Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition.

So many have contributed to the reimagining of Catholic Education in this St Mary's precinct in the past 18 months and to the vision of St Mary's College, and I was delighted that several contributors were able to celebrate with us. There is much work to be done still though, as we continue the tradition of educating the hearts of our young people.

I have long believed that schools are built on relationships and belonging, get these right and everything else falls into line. Our Year 7 students commence their journey as St Mary's College students last week and next with their coastal camp. We pray that the friendships formed, and the sense of belonging achieved through the camp experience goes with them throughout their lives.

Congratulations goes to the boys who competed in the ACC Athletics competition last Thursday and to Mr Hawkins and the Sports staff involved. Great spirit and determination were on show as they came home with 11 first placings, 15 second placings and 11 third placings.

Gender Relations

This past week, in the media, the brave on-line petition by numerous young women brought into sharp focus the pattern of sexual violence that is a sad, disturbing blight on our society. St Mary's College stands united with our governing body, Edmund Rice Australia, in our ongoing commitment to taking brave steps in addressing the issue of sexual consent and enshrining programs and practices that, in partnership with parents, aim to support the development of respectful young men.

Our College's Pastoral Program is informed by the Victorian Government's Respectful Relationships Program. Every year from Year 7, each student completes a one term unit on the topic 'Gender and Identity.' Our students are educated on what constitutes respectful relationships in domestic and social settings, how to identity gender-based violence, the link between negative sexual stereotyping and explicit sexual material, how to make good decisions in social environments and how to assertively seek help if one is exposed to any form of gender-based violence.

Our staff has undertaken professional development on Ethical Schooling by Leanne Higham, an academic from La Trobe University. She is an author of the Respectful Relationships Program. In her sessions, Leanne advocated that schools, in partnerships with parents, are formative to build positive attitudes and values in regard to gender relations. She promotes the importance of respectful language in schools towards all genders, particularly our female students. Our staff undertook structured professional development to acquire school-wide professional language norms that creates an inclusive, respectful climate within our school.

Our school provides numerous opportunities for our boys to have respectful social interactions with our girls. These include: Peer Mentoring at Year 7 and 10, musical and drama productions, a Year 12 College Formal, Outdoor Education Programs and numerous House Sport events. Here, we see positive relationships being formed between boys and girls. We set high standards in regard to the respectful, thoughtful manner boys must bring to these activities and all interactions with girls in these settings.

Our school is an enthusiastic participant in ventures that promote respectful behaviour towards women, such as: International Women's Day, Bullying No Way Day and R U Okay. These establish and support inclusivity, one of the founding touchstones of the Edmund Rice charism.

The courageous, disturbing testimonies from these young women in the recent media, demonstrate that there is still much work to be done by schools, and the wider community, on the issue of how women are treated by men. As a school committed to preserving the dignity of each person and, in partnership with parents, helping form responsible, respectful relationships, we welcome the Victorian Government's commitment to exploring the idea of more explicitly creating teaching and learning strategies on the area of sexual consent. We look forward to building on work already undertaken in this area.

He was selected as one of eight winners from 918 international entries to record his composition 'Come Sleep' for the Abbey Road Anthem Competition in 2011 to celebrate the studio's 80th anniversary. This recording was conducted and performed by Eric Whitacre and his singers. He has several published choral titles.

Mr Brinsmead currently resides and works in Melbourne, Australia, as the Musical Director of several choirs, a singing and piano tutor, accompanist, composer, arranger and

orchestrator.



Every year, many tertiary scholarships, available to school leavers go unused. Students may be reluctant to apply, mistakenly believing that scholarships are only awarded to the very highest achievers. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Certainly, there are University Merit Scholarships that are awarded automatically to those achieving the highest ATARs. However, scholarships are available for VET studies too! Most importantly, there are Equity Scholarships, which are awarded to students who have the potential to achieve, if they are given the financial assistance and support to do so.

Two of the most valuable scholarships currently available are due to close quite soon: The Hansen Scholarship at the University of Melbourne and the Tuckwell Scholarship at Australian National University.

These scholarships were described in full in the first edition of *Directions*, the St Mary's College Careers Newsletter, which was emailed to all senior students and their parents recently.

Selection criteria for these scholarships include a combination of the following criteria:

- academic potential and achievements
- · any type of significant achievements to date
- ability to use skills to assist others, work effectively in a team and lead those around you
- a strong desire to give back to the community
- the ability to achieve success in the face of adversity and overcome obstacles.

In addition to these, are the numerous scholarships and cadetships offered by other organisations, such as the Children of Veterans, Rotary and even the Master Plumbers. They are available for all Tertiary courses.

St Mary's students should feel confident that they have all the abilities, values and attributes needed to be selected for any of these awards. Just go for it! As Nelson Mandela said:


The online survey sent out by email consisted of 5 questions. It asked for input on what was liked and disliked about the current uniform and what other items they would like to be considered? We also gained further insights to proritise elements of the design by asking respondents to tick the 'most important' elements of the uniform.

Survey respondents top 5 considerations

- 1. durable long lasting
- 2. value for money affordable
- 3. easy to clean
- 4. summer shirts with a short cut that does not need to be tucked in
- 5. girls to be able to wear summer shorts and winter pants as an option

The survey was opened on Thursday 25 February 2021 and closed at 8pm on Tuesday 2 March. Thank you to the 558 people who responded, this gives us community voice for the

next step of the process, being developing a design brief.



The next New Uniform Committee meetings will be held on Wednesday 10 March, students at lunchtime 12:30pm and parents by Teams on Wednesday evening 7:30 (invites will be sent soon). This meeting will bring together a larger group to include the Consultative team and the Focus Discussion group team to discuss the analysis of the written responses from the survey to further develop the design brief.

2021 Fee Accounts

All 2021 Fee Accounts are due and payable by **31 March 2021**, unless an approved Payment Plan is in place by this date.

Where a family pays the entire Family Fee Account balance prior to 31 March 2021 a \$350 Early Payment Discount will be credited to the Family Fee Account.

*Please note that the Early Payment Discount does not apply to Scholarship, Bursary and Fee Assistance Accounts.

Pay the entire Family Fee account balance prior to 31	Eligible for \$350 *Early Payment
March 2021	Discount

Families making a full payment of Fees before 31 March 2021 may deduct the \$350 amount from the payment. Please note that in order to receive this discount the entire Family Fee Account balance for all students within the Family attending St Mary's College must be received into the St Mary's College bank account by 31 March 2021.

For the sake of clarity, deposits received in the St Mary's College bank account on 1 April 2021 will not be eligible to receive the Early Payment Discount.

Where Families elect to pay by instalments, a 2021 Fee Payment Agreement Form must be completed, signed and lodged with the Finance Office by **28 February 2021.**

All payment arrangements must be finalised by 31 October 2021.

Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund

2020 Applications are now Open

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Funding (CSEF) is a \$225 annual payment to schools that can be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of eligible students.

To qualify for the CSEF your family must satisfy the following criteria or be an eligible beneficiary of one of the following cards:

- Veterans Affairs Gold Card
- Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC)
- Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, or
- be a temporary foster parent, or
- the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card).

A special consideration eligibility category also exists.

The CSEF is paid directly to St Mary's College and will be credited against your Fee Account at St Mary's College to contribute towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.
