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
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# From the Principal

This week we celebrated the Feast Day of Blessed Edmund Rice. After commencing the day in prayer, we came together as community to celebrate our heritage. We are very lucky to be an Edmund Rice school because the heritage and story of Edmund continues to make sense to enrich the lives of our community.

The focus of Edmund, of a meaningful life as one that is enriched by living beyond selfserving interest, permeates all we do.

The key values passed down from Edmund Rice over two centuries ago, have not been lost. Instead, they make up the very fabric of who we are. We continue to go back to them, reconsider them, and renew our understandings. One of our key touchstones is a commitment to social justice. This commitment began with Edmund Rice, in Waterford (in Ireland) where, as a wealthy businessman, in the 1790's he became increasingly disturbed by the number of street children who were not only considered a social nuisance - but were also barely surviving. Consequently, they regularly resorted to crime. He realised education was the key to making a real difference.

This week's celebration focusses us on the values of justice and service. Each school community boasts a unique combination of assets upon which to build its future. We are privileged to have the legacy of Edmund as that foundation, for now and the future.

At St Mary's College we will continue to challenge students regarding phones at school when we see them because we believe it is our responsibility to reduce the distractions to learning that phones can be to many students. We ask that parents help us by talking the issue through with your son or daughter and encourage them to follow the school expectation of leaving phones in lockers throughout the day. This is not to say that we are unaware of our obligations to foster our young people to be responsible digital citizens, rather it is to say that schools are about learning and it is clear that for many young people the presence of phones are an unnecessary distraction to their learning.

I recently read with interest the results of a research study that stated that four in five students, some from as young as four years old, own at least one digital device and almost a third are allowed to take them to bed every night. The study showed parents and teachers were equally worried that students were 'negatively distracted' by digital technologies. The report also found students from lower socioeconomic backgrounds were more likely to take their phones to bed, having a significant impact on all important sleep. 'Without being alarmist, we cannot sit back and be content to watch an entire generation of young people be put at risk by unregulated access to digital tools that they don't know how to manage,' the report said.

Throughout this year we will review the College's approach to phones at school with a view to finding a balance between the important need for students to have these devices, while not impacting on teaching and learning, as they no doubt do.

This week, on Wednesday 5 May we celebrated the feast of Blessed Edmund Rice. We remembered him as a man of great faith and generous heart who had a vision of what could be.

Our Gospel reading for the day was John 15, Jesus the True Vine.

I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower.....

In the passage Jesus is preaching to his disciples and he uses the image of a vine and its branches to get his message across. He uses this metaphor to explain how believing in him will bear the fruit and a branch which produces no fruit will be pruned. Pruning therefore is part of life. Fr Jerome in his homily suggested that we have to prune preconceptions, dead images, cliches and lazy thought patterns. What we need to do is listen and look closely and when we do, just as Jesus tells us, new life emerges.

Pruning is necessary for growth. Not just in horticulture but in our personal life. If we want to grow then we must change. We have to be like Edmund. Cut away what is holding us back and work towards the future we imagine.

# Learning

### Assessment Years 7 – 10

Assessment at Year 7 – 10 has looked a bit different this year as we have moved to the 4 performance levels; **Developing, Consolidating, Proficient and Accomplished**, to assess the understanding and skills that students need to demonstrate for the task. This was done to provide more information about the student's learning.

A description of each level and how students demonstrate their knowledge and skills for each level:

Performance level	Explanation
Not yet demonstrated / Not shown	<ul> <li>The student demonstrates:</li> <li>no or incomplete response for the assessment task</li> <li>a need for significant assistance to prepare a response</li> <li>a limited understanding of the topic</li> </ul>
Developing	The student demonstrates:

In an article by Geoff Masters in Teacher Magazine *How well do grades convey student* attainment and progress?, he points out that grades are a poor indicator of progress or

learning as they are based on a particular piece of work.

Assigning grades to a piece of work has also been found to be subjective and lack consistency. A grade, be it a percentage or a letter grade, does not provide any information on the complexity of a task or the knowledge and skills needed to attain a certain grade.

The rubric gives a description of the understanding and skills that a student will need to demonstrate at each level. These descriptors provide an awareness of what needs to be done and allows students to know what they can do to progress to the next level. This is a powerful learning tool as it makes the outcome of the task very clear. Students can use the rubric to self-assess the level of their skills and understanding and then to challenge themselves to move to the next level.

The feedback provided to parents by the rubric clearly shows the learning that the student has demonstrated and how they can improve their performance. This empowers parents to engage with their sons/daughters and the teacher in rich discussions that focus on future learning.

It is our hope that as we become more familiar with this feedback system that students will take more ownership of their learning by reviewing and analysing their responses before they submit their work. And that they would have a conversation with their teachers after the work has been assessed to discuss ways that they can improve their skills.

#### 2021 Applications are now Open

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Funding (CSEF) is a \$225 annual payment to schools that can be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of eligible students.

To qualify for the CSEF your family must satisfy the following criteria or be an eligible beneficiary of one of the following cards:

- · Veterans Affairs Gold Card
- Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC)
- Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, or
- be a temporary foster parent, or
- the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card).
- \* A special consideration eligibility category also exists.
