As the end of Term 1 quickly draws near, I would like to acknowledge the support received from our parent/carer community over the course of this Term. There have been times where a note of thanks or a smile at drop off from a parent has had a great impact on me personally – it is greatly appreciated.

There is also much to reflect upon in terms of student achievement so far this year. The significance of the transition from one year to the next – moving to the next year level – is often not commented on. However, the positive and confident way that this has taken place in all year levels is commendable. Outside of the classroom, we have seen students excel in sport, such as the ACC and SCSA swimming carnivals held last week, and through contributions to social justice, such as the Term 1 Project Compassion collection. Our Year 12 students have established their identity as leaders of the school. It is not uncommon to see study groups working in the Senior Studies Hub from 7:15am most days. They have brought a new level of organisation to whole school events and have demonstrated that they lead by example. Year 10 students have embraced their role as campus leaders at the Edmund Rice Campus. They meet with Year 7 students as peer mentors and have set a very good tone in the yard for our youngest students to follow. Focus on Strengths

A key part of the College's Student Wellbeing Vision is the focus on student strengths. In doing this, we seek to create an environment where student strengths are referenced regularly and our students are encouraged to use these strengths to thrive within the school community but also to call on them to push through challenging times. These aims illuminate perhaps the most important word in education: encouragement. A community which encourages is one where the pursuit of improvement and excellence are likely to be foundational traits. Further, the community will be a warm and welcoming one where students feel supported to try new activities and, as a result, really connect and thrive.

We have established a Commendation Structure to drive encouragement and better allow students to acknowledge their strengths and positive contributions. Once a student receives one commendation, they are given a certificate and a Bronze Badge. If they garner five commendations, in a range of categories (there are 12 to choose from), they are eligible for a Silver Badge to be presented at a year-level assembly. If they reach 10, they receive a Gold Badge, which is presented in front of the whole school community.

Thus far, we have issued over 200 Commendations. I am noticing a number of Bronze Badges adorning blazers. Some students are on the cusp of making it to silver. Please enquire with your son/daughter if they know about the process and if they have been awarded any certificates.

Hopefully, you will a Bronze Badge appearing on the blazer in the not-too-distant future!

Dealing with difficult news items in the media

There have been a number of students who have spoken about how confronting the news is at the moment. In particular, they cite Ukraine and the war with Russia. The images of lines of refugees fleeing their homeland and the bombed shells of buildings, can be very distressing.

Such news items can lead us to feel overwhelmed, anxious, sad, worried, helpless and possibly depressed. Psychologists suggest a number of ways to deal with such distressing news items.

Firstly, learn to switch off from social media and the news. Only look at the news for a set time each day and for the other times when you might be looking at social media, go for a walk, read a book or listen to music.

Secondly, choose your news sources carefully. Avoid sensational snippets designed to get you in and cause an emotional response. Seek out news sources that are based on truth, are independent, accountable and fair. If there are still parts of these news items that cause distress, switch them off.

Thirdly, consider why the news is so upsetting to you personally. It can be very triggering if it reminds you of past experiences or causes flashbacks from traumatic events. In such instances, it is best to talk to someone about these upsetting emotions.

Finally, avoid looking at the news or current affair shows entirely, if you know they are going to be upsetting. Tell your family members that this is your plan and keep to it.

If we keep to these suggestions and take control of our viewing, we may not find such news items so distressing.

Pathways

VTAC SPECIAL ENTRY ACCESS SCHEME (SEAS)

Last week I spoke to our Year 12 students in a Community Meeting about the VTAC SEAS application process and how they should be preparing for their tertiary applications later in the year. As only two-thirds of the class were present for this, I think it is important for parents to understand the process as well, so they can assist their students in the busy times ahead. SEAS is available for *all* Year 12 students: VCAL, VCE and non-scored.

Just briefly, the SEAS process allows for ATARs (or other selection methods) to be adjusted to account for any educational disadvantage to the student over the course of their education. There are four categories:

- 1. **Personal Information and Location** includes first in family to attend university, indigenous or non-English speaking background, gender and more.
- 2. Disadvantaged Financial Background Centrelink, HCC or Family Tax Benefit.
- Disability or Medical Condition Learning needs, mental and physical health issues.
- 4. Difficult Circumstances Anything that beyond the applicant's control, and not already covered by a previous category. This will include the effects of remote learning in 2020-21.

Categories 3 and 4 require students to write an Impact Statement and, in addition, to have someone who knows the situation (not family) write a Statement of Support.

The most important point I made to the students present was that, even though the application is not made until August/September, they need to be preparing in the following ways:

- Find documents needed for evidence Centrelink or tax records
- Keep records of any appointments, absences, time lost etc
- Start thinking about the impacts of the various issues on their education
- Most importantly seek help or share their situation with someone who is qualified to write the statement of support: Medical professional, school counsellor, teacher, social worker etc. They need to have had ongoing discussions with this person – no surprises!

I understand that students and parents might find this all very confusing, but there is no need to panic. There will be more information sessions for students throughout Term 3. VTAC applications will be done in class in August, and students are able to have as many Careers Meetings as they need.

For parents, I intend to hold an Information Evening in May, to explain all the ins and outs of VTAC applications and offers, SEAS and scholarships. An invitation will be emailed closer to the time.





Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund

2022 Applications are now Open

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Funding (CSEF) is an annual payment to schools that can be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of eligible students.

To qualify for the CSEF your family must satisfy the following criteria or be an eligible beneficiary of one of the following cards:

- Veterans Affairs Gold Card
- Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC)
- Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, or
- be a temporary foster parent, or
- the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card).
- * A special consideration eligibility category also exists.

The CSEF is a \$225 payment that is paid directly to the St Mary's College and will be credited against your Fee Account to contribute towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child. 2022 Capital Works

St Mary's College has commenced work on a new Lift and Stair on the McCartney Wing of Edmund Rice Campus together with a new entrance ramp at the Main Reception entrance. You will have noticed the construction fencing erected inside Entrance B and demolition works are well underway on the McCartney Wing. The work on the foundations for the new Lift and Stair is commencing this week.

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) Program

If you are looking to upgrade or for a new device for school or home, Parents are reminded that you can purchase one of the specified devices through the St Mary's College BYOD Portal. It will be the Parents' responsibility to make sure the device is insured under their Home and Contents insurance.

The advantages of purchasing the device through the St Mary's College BYOD Portal is that all devices have 3 years warranty, supported onsite at school. Any warranty issues can be reported to the St Mary's College IT Helpdesk and will be resolved onsite at St Mary's College by CompNow or their Service Agents. Families who purchase from a retailer will typically receive a 12-month warranty that is supported "return to base" meaning families would need to go back to the retailer for support. Families also have the option of purchasing CompNow Accidental Damage Insurance, an insurance policy that covers for all accidental damage or outright loss (due to theft) that is not covered by the warranty.

Please note that due to a new Government Regulation, CompNow and other providers are not able to sell or package ADP solutions at the same time as the purchase of your new device. You will receive an email 5 days from your purchase asking you to do so, we recommend taking up this option for peace of mind.
