# From the Principal

Terry Blizzard

Welcome to Term 2, to all members of the St Mary's College community. A special welcome to the new families and staff who are joining us. It would not be an understatement to suggest we have commenced the Term running!

Our return this week coincided with one of the more significant events in our national calendar, the commemoration of ANZAC Day, a most important celebration of our national identity. Over the generations ANZAC Day has become more than a commemoration of those fateful events on the beaches of Gallipoli, becoming a time of national reflection to give thanks for the many sacrifices made in all conflicts and wars Australians have participated in.

At St Mary's College we marked the day on Wednesday April 27 conducting a remembrance service projected into classrooms from Logue Hall. The commemoration of ANZAC has long been a priority in the College. As has been the case in the past, we were delighted to have Alumni veterans join us to participate in this important event, albeit not in a larger gathering as we hope to return to post COVID times.

I am very proud also to say that our College Band, under the guidance of Mrs Louisa Lawless again represented the College with distinction at the Caulfield RSL ANZAC Day Dawn Service.

We are constantly reminded of the critical role we play in the formation of our young men and women and are acutely aware of the need to take a great deal of care with our ANZAC Day celebrations to make certain we are delivering the right message to our students. We will give thanks for the great deeds of past students of the College, and hope the current incumbents hear the message of the need to influence events in their world, and that they choose peace and joy as their default.

### **Blessed Edmund Feast Day**

This week we celebrate the Feast Day of Blessed Edmund Rice, a day where we come together as community to celebrate our heritage. The focus of Edmund of a meaningful life as one that is enriched by living beyond self-serving interest, must permeate all we do.

The key values passed down from Edmund Rice over two centuries ago have not been lost. Instead, they make up the very fabric of who we are. We continue to go back to them, reconsider them and renew our understandings. One of our key touchstones is a commitment to social justice and the service of others. This commitment began with Edmund Rice, in Waterford (in Ireland) where, as a wealthy businessman, in the 1790's he became increasingly disturbed by the number of street children who were not only considered a social nuisance - but were also barely surviving. Consequently, they regularly resorted to crime. He realised education was the key to making a real difference.

This week's celebration focusses us on these values of justice and service. Each school community boasts a unique combination of assets upon which to build its future. We are privileged to have the legacy of Edmund as that foundation for now and the future.

I thank the parent and staff members and look forward to input from student members also. # **Around the College**

The spirit of Blessed Edmund Rice certainly comes alive this week at St Mary's College, with his Feast Day taking place on Tuesday 17 May. The day begins with a liturgy, where the whole school community comes together to be reminded of the reason we exist as a school. It is the ministry of Blessed Edmund Rice, who truly saw a need and acted, that continues to permeate our culture today. Edmund is who we are, and we exist as a school because of him. The four touchstones of Edmund Rice Education Australia: Liberating Education, Inclusive Community, Justice and Solidarity and Gospel Spirituality provide an ever-present guide for how we can be faithful to Edmund's mission. This will be embraced and celebrated publicly on Thursday morning. The rest of the day is an opportunity to come together and celebrate who we are, with a talent show, a range of amusement activities and attractions – even the opportunity to dunk the Principal!

Also this week we launch our annual social justice walkathon, which takes place on Friday June 3. The build up to the Walkathon over the next few weeks is always an exciting part of the year. The Social Justice Team will speak at assemblies, attend morning pastoral care class groups, and use multiple forms of communication to publicise the most important aspect of this event – *WHY WE WALK*. Too often we are only vaguely drawn into the purpose of why we offer a donation for a cause which we are connected with.

Our intention is to provide all students with a deep understanding of the reasons why we walk. We stand in solidarity with those in our (local and global) community that are the most vulnerable. We collect money in support of this claim and walk together in solidarity (as one community) as a public display of this commitment.

We trust that the sacred writings of the Bible will inspire our students to discover the person of Jesus Christ and how he lived his life to better the world.


Fr Jerome then blessed the bibles with the following prayer:



# **VCE**

It is amazing how quickly time passes and we are now halfway through Unit 1 & 3. This means that Year 12 students only have two more full terms of classes, as Term 4 is mainly used as revision and preparation for exams.

With time moving so quickly, it is important that students should have already established a home study program and remain consistent so that good habits forged this term are not broken. Unit 1 students will have exams towards the end of the term and Unit 3 students should be preparing their notes and ensure that they understand the concepts covered. There will be some classes completing trial exams for Unit 3 subjects, however, as the time for Unit 4 is restricted there wont be a structured Unit 3 exam timetable this term. So students should ensure that all elements of the course are understood and if not, the staff are always willing to provide additional assistance.

This term, I will be arranging meetings with small groups of VCE students to discuss ways to improve their study schedules and discuss strategies to make use of their time. It is also recommended that students in Year 12 utilise their time on Tuesdays and Wednesday afternoons and remain at school. This time should be used for study and it is good to see the study hub becoming more busy each week.

If your child is having problems with studying it is important that they reach out so we can provide them with the support they need. As stated before to be successful in VCE consistency in study is important.



## **Updating to St Mary's College Blazer Pockets**

The College is keen to provide the opportunity to have the students from all year levels proudly wear the St Mary's College name and emblem on their blazer pockets. We currently have nearly 200 pockets available for re-pocketing, and will be arranging more in line with demand. If you would like to have your blazer pockets changed over from the old CBC and PCW name, there are the two options available.

1. Submit the blazer to Reception at either campus by Thursday 12 May (there also will be subsequent batches for submission after this timeframe) and these blazers will be labelled and submitted to the embroiderer that we have been using. The total cost is

- \$40, (\$18 for the pocket and \$22 for the embroiderer). FYI, the old pockets will be returned with the completed blazers.
- Purchase a pocket (to match either black or navy blazers) from our onsite Midford uniform shop for \$18 and arrange your own re-pocketing.

Families can pay the \$40 by EFT at Reception when dropping off the Blazer.

### Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund – 2022 Applications are now Open

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Funding (CSEF) is an annual payment to schools that can be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of eligible students.

To qualify for the CSEF your family must satisfy the following criteria or be an eligible beneficiary of one of the following cards:

- Veterans Affairs Gold Card
- Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC)
- Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, or
- be a temporary foster parent, or
- the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card).
- \* A special consideration eligibility category also exists.

### **Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) Program**

If you are looking to upgrade or for a new device for school or home, Parents are reminded that you can purchase one of the specified devices through the St Mary's College BYOD Portal. It will be the Parents' responsibility to make sure the device is insured under their Home and Contents insurance.

The advantages of purchasing the device through the St Mary's College BYOD Portal is that all devices have 3 years warranty, supported onsite at school. Any warranty issues can be reported to the St Mary's College IT Helpdesk and will be resolved onsite at St Mary's College by CompNow or their Service Agents. Families who purchase from a retailer will typically receive a 12-month warranty that is supported "return to base" meaning families would need to go back to the retailer for support. Families also have the option of purchasing CompNow Accidental Damage Insurance, an insurance policy that covers for all accidental damage or outright loss (due to theft) that is not covered by the warranty.

Please note that due to a new Government Regulation, CompNow and other providers are not able to sell or package ADP solutions at the same time as the purchase of your new device. You will receive an email 5 days from your purchase asking you to do so, we recommend taking up this option for peace of mind.
