Vale Fr Bob. Maguire

My first encounter with Fr Bob was over a decade ago, and like many who came across the unconventional Catholic priest, it was a memorable experience.

At the time I was working in another Catholic secondary school and the occasion was our end of year Mass and Christmas function. Mass was celebrated at St. Peter and Paul's Church in South Melbourne where Fr Bob was the parish priest.

As I entered the church I walked past a series of trestle tables, set up for a meal. As school staff began to slowly arrive, we sat and chatted. During this time Fr Bob was talking with parish folk regarding a community luncheon being held after our Mass. From a distance I watched a man who was energised by those he spoke with. He gesticulated wildly and laughed loudly. He embraced those dressed in their finery the same as those who had appeared to have fallen on hard times. This all happened on the sanctuary. I was spell bound.



Mass began and was proceeding as we would all expect when suddenly a mobile phone started ringing. The staff all looked around for the culprit, only to see Fr Bob reaching into his pocket to answer his ringing phone. He didn't just turn it off as we expected, he stopped mid homily to advise the caller about the time the chickens needed to be delivered for his community lunch that day.

Fr Bob apologised for the interruption and explained the importance of his community coming together. He spoke with love and compassion for those some might find hard to love.

As our Mass was coming to an end people started to gather at the back of the church around the tables which were all beautifully decorated with Christmas cheer. Some felt they were intruding on our Mass, but Fr Bob waved them forward. They were his people, they belonged, we were the outsiders.

Fr Bob attended CBC St Kilda from 1948 to 1953. He was a passionate supporter of our school and relished the opportunity to come and talk with our students. He would often talk longer than planned as he challenged everyone's view about God, the church and our love for each other. The resounding response from students afterwards was always...when is he coming back? In recent years 50% of our Walkathon donations have gone to the Fr Bob Foundation who work to support local families in times of crisis.

I was downhearted when I learnt of Fr Bob's passing. He had been a welcoming embrace for so many and I wondered who would advocate and love the unlovable in the future.

So much has been written about Fr Bob's passing yet one that resonated with me, printed in the Herald Sun recently, was written by an old friend, Rev Kevin Burke.

Vale comrade Bob Maguire, quintessentially a sage prophet as well as imaginative philosopher and creative poet. Bob was a radical disruptor of Trumpian proportions, a

creator of chaos and confusion. He thrived on the mystery and paradox that is life and he spoke in riddles, parables and enigmas. Tapping into his linguistic code was a mountainous challenge. Bob Maguire had a wicked sense of humour which he utilized to delightfully disarming effect.

FROM THE ARTS




These last couple weeks, students (particularly us seniors) have hit the ground running as Term Two commences.

The senior team was first in division two as was the combined under 17 and senior category.

Noah Chapple began the night well for St Mary's with second place in the open 200m Freestyle despite being a member of the under 14 team. His time of 2:16.19 was a new under 14 record as was his 1:05.94 for the 100m freestyle which he did on the way.

The senior medley relay team was outstanding finishing first was a new school record of 2:05.32. The team consisted of **Tom Seeliger**, **Ayden McCarroll**, **Mateo Moradi** and **Harry Charlesworth**.

Throughout the rest of the night the seniors continued to establish new school records proving to be the best senior team in the history of the college.



Congratulations, Ms McGuinness Year 4, your class achieved 100% pass rate!



INSIGHT - NIC HOWARD YEAR 12 (GYMNASTICS)

From climbing on housing furniture, to partaking in gymnastics at a competitive level. Year 12 gymnastic champion Nic Howard has lived the dream internationally in recent times. Look no further, than representing his country away in Germany and Turkey.



With Nic having high confidence levels on his own ability, the outcome on the international stage portrayed it.

Prior to the tournament, Nic wasn't expecting to come away with a medal. But with his meticulous training and preparation, this led him to performing three of his best routines. Therefore, he made it to three finals on the second day of competition.

From his finals, he came away with some brilliant placings. He finished sixth in high bars, fifth in rings and a lovely bronze medal on the vault.

On the events' couch, consisted of the top three place getters. As the scores came through, it proved as a sigh of relief for Nic, having held on for a podium finish.

Along with the outcome he delivered, the 17-year-old also enjoyed performing on the international stage, with significant crowd numbers watching on.

"The atmosphere was something I've never had before. The arena was pretty much full. Almost 7,000 people there apparently, which was big for a gymnastics competition", says Howard.

"That increase pressure was a good experience as well and something I can take on for the future competitions I'm in."

Along with the crowd noise, finals time proved as one where athletes performing, were in front of everyone. This meant, no one else was performing at the same time as another.

"In finals, everyone is watching just you. No one else is going at the same time, it's just you. Which means, more pressure to do well. I did pretty well, putting out three of the best routines I could, I was happy with."

Nic has preparations in sight this coming month, for the Australian Junior classic, which are being held on the Gold Coast. This is followed by Nationals less than a week later.

INSIGHT - XAVIER MAGNANINI YEAR 10 (GYMNASTICS)

Year 10 student Xavier Magnanini also experienced international triumph, coming away with top podium finishes!

In contrast however, Xavier had a less than ideal preparation, heading into the competition. Leading into the week of State Championships, Xavier only had five days to prepare his routines, having fully recovered from a back and wrist injury. Despite this, he still had to perform certain skills he's never done before, just a day before competition began.

To his credit, he performed remarkably well. Xavier won gold medal and was awarded the All-Around Victorian Champion in his level 9 under 18 category. Plus, winning gold on his floor and vault appearances.

Xavier was amazed himself, having performed above his own expectations. He says a lot of the credit, goes to elevating the difficulty on his own routines.

"It was a bit of a surprise, I went into the competition with low expectations and targets, and went home with a first place," says Magnanini.

"I've been upgrading my difficulty in my routines, while continuing to solidify the skills that I already had. I'm ready to go now, and to push to get some great results this year."

In addition, this isn't the only experience Xavier has had from a state level. He has represented the state on six other occasions within his career. This is alongside his maiden appearance for Australia, competing in the Austria National Cup, late last year.

Xavier's gymnastics journey all started at the age of two, alongside with a friend. Four years later, he started competing. He has continued with eventual progression over the years. He made the AIS High performance program at nine years old, plus making national squad camps. Furthermore, he has been a state champion on multiple occasions.

Xavier's focus now turns to competing for Victoria, at the National Championships in May.
