### REFLECTION

### **DARREN ATKINSON**

### College Principal

As I pause to reflect on the first half of this year, my introduction to St Mary's College, it is with the sound of heavy machinery in the background. But rather than consider this noise pollution, it is "music to our ears" for those who have been long awaiting the redevelopment of one of our most valuable learning spaces on the Edmund Rice Campus. It marks the next important step in realising our vision for an exciting future at St Mary's College and, more generally, for Catholic coeducation in inner Melbourne. When the redevelopment of the McCartney Wing and the McCarthy (Yumba) Building is completed in a couple of months, our whole school community will unite on one campus at 11 Westbury St, East St Kilda and there is a genuine air of excitement about this future. There is belief in our motto – Better Together – and that while the physical environment needs to support learning, it is in building upon caring and respectful relationships that true transformation occurs. The warm welcome one receives when they join the College community is real. Others had told me about it, and most schools profess to offer it on their website, but experiencing it is special.

In articulating our vision for Catholic co-education at St Mary's College we started the year by focusing on our School Improvement Plan. After consultation with our students, parents, and teachers, we were able to define four key priority areas:

- Pride in our Identity we want to celebrate that we are proudly one of many schools in the Edmund Rice Tradition.
- High Expectations we should have high expectations of each other.
- Inclusivity we want St Mary's College to be a place known for inclusion and equity.
- Excellence in Learning we strive for excellent outcomes for all our learners.

Within these four priority areas we have identified intended outcomes and the targets that we seek to achieve over the next four years. Our future as a mid-sized co-educational learning centre where students are known, understood, and empowered is exciting. To be able to perform at their best, young people need to feel that they belong, and our young people, especially those who have already experienced secondary schooling elsewhere, tell us that this is a feature of the student experience at St Mary's College. There has been much good work already done in our brief history thank you to the efforts of Mr Terry Blizzard and Mr Michael Lee, my predecessors, our passionate staff, and great support from the School Advisory Council and parent community and we look to build upon these strong foundations.




















### **CAPITAL WORKS**






# EXPLORING BINARY CODE IN YEAR 7 DIGITECH CLASSES!
