STUDENT WELLBEING AT THE FOREFRONT

AS WITH SO MANY OTHER AREAS OF COLLEGE LIFE, **TERRY** HAS MADE A SIGNIFICANT **POSITIVE IMPRINT** ON STUDENT **WELLBEING**.

Our vision for wellbeing, anchored in creating a sense of belonging and establishing positive relationships across the school, came out of seeing how respectful and fair he was in every conversation he had with students and his vast work in this area in previous roles. On the ground, he always seemed to know something about each student, had a question to ask, a point of praise to deliver. The pressures of Principalship – often diffuse, exacting and vexing – were never permeated in these exchanges. Indeed, most Principals talk belonging and respect; some consistently exhibit it; few always exhibit it. Terry sits comfortably in the last bracket – he was always decent and fair and, through both word and action, established these markers at our College. We are a kinder and better place with these enshrined and evident in what we do.

Our pastoral care has seen a huge uptick during Terry's time here. He re-wrote the pastoral teacher role, played a crucial role in establishing on-line wellbeing check-ins and created an environment where students know that teachers were there to care and support them. In our conversations, Terry always espoused the importance of positive relationships with students. We cannot be the school we wish to be unless these are in place. This statement is both evolved and compassionate but also grounded in logic. Once the relationship is set, once respect is consistently evident, once real care in on display, the vast majority of conversations would be constructive and positive and there is no conversation that is too difficult. Again, this is a significant cultural change and one that we have all benefited from.

Our transition programs have improved significantly during Terry's tenure. Students know the history of the precinct, the values and the vision and aspirations for our new school. These programs connect students to the College and to each other. Terry would often say that students who feel part of something – especially something really positive – will invariably find their way and enjoy their time at school. These programs were built by Terry with both reference to the evidence-base but authentic to the atmosphere and spirit of our College.

On a personal note, I have found Terry to be a great person to work for. He is both fun and incredibly fair-minded. I will never forget him singing 'Never Tear Us Apart' and hoisting a make-believe Port Adelaide scarf in the air when I asked him if he was supporting the Tigers or Port in a game a few years ago! He is a real support when times are tough and a great source of optimism during those humdrum, middling days. It's the consistency, however, that is most admirable. He was unfailing in his respectful interactions with everyone. This requires a decency, a self-regulation and a genuine determination to be of service and benefit to others. He was in the role for the students — their betterment, their happiness. I, and the Pastoral Team, deeply admire him for this.

Our school is better for his leadership and we are grateful for his time here. We are sad to see him leave but understand the need to support his family. We wish Terry, his wife Sue, and his wider family, happiness and health in the future.



VALE FR BOB. Maguire

MY FIRST ENCOUNTER WITH **FR BOB** WAS OVER A DECADE AGO, AND LIKE MANY WHO CAME ACROSS THE UNCONVENTIONAL CATHOLIC PRIEST, IT WAS A **MEMORABLE** EXPERIENCE.

At the time I was working in another Catholic secondary school and the occasion was our end of year Mass and Christmas function. Mass was celebrated at St. Peter and Paul's Church in South Melbourne where Fr Bob was the parish priest.

As I entered the church I walked past a series of trestle tables, set up for a meal. As school staff began to slowly arrive, we sat and chatted. During this time Fr Bob was talking with parish folk regarding a community luncheon being held after our Mass. From a distance I watched a man who was energised by those he spoke with. He gesticulated wildly and laughed loudly. He embraced those dressed in their finery the same as those who had appeared to have fallen on hard times. This all happened on the sanctuary. I was spell bound.

Mass began and was proceeding as we would all expect when suddenly a mobile phone started ringing. The staff all looked around for the culprit, only to see Fr Bob reaching into his pocket to answer his ringing phone. He didn't just turn it off as we expected, he stopped mid homily to advise the caller about the time the chickens needed to be delivered for his community lunch that day.

Fr Bob apologised for the interruption and explained the importance of his community coming together. He spoke with love and compassion for those some might find hard to love.

As our Mass was coming to an end people started to gather at the back of the church around the tables which were all

beautifully decorated with Christmas cheer. Some felt they were intruding on our Mass, but Fr Bob waved them forward. They were his people, they belonged, we were the outsiders.

Fr Bob attended CBC St Kilda from 1948 to 1953. He was a passionate supporter of our school and relished the opportunity to come and talk with our students. He would often talk longer than planned as he challenged everyone's view about God, the church and our love for each other. The resounding response from students afterwards was always...when is he coming back? In recent years 50% of our Walkathon donations have gone to the Fr Bob Foundation who work to support local families in times of crisis.

I was downhearted when I learnt of Fr Bob's passing. He had been a welcoming embrace for so many and I wondered who would advocate and love the unlovable in the future.

So much has been written about Fr Bob's passing yet one that resonated with me, printed in the Herald Sun recently, was written by an old friend, Rev Kevin Burke.

Vale comrade Bob Maguire, quintessentially a sage prophet as well as imaginative philosopher and creative poet. Bob was a radical disruptor of Trumpian proportions, a creator of chaos and confusion. He thrived on the mystery and paradox that is life and he spoke in riddles, parables and enigmas. Tapping into his linguistic code was a mountainous challenge. Bob Maguire had a wicked sense of humour which he utilized to delightfully disarming effect.



"WE'RE OFF TO SEE THE WIZARD!"


St. Mary's proudly presents the timeless classic 'The Wizard of Oz' this September.
