FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I would like to thank the St Mary's community for welcoming me and working with me so warmly. The talent of the staff and the charm and efficacy of the students will stay with me for a long time. I would particularly like to acknowledge the Deputy Principal, Mr Shaun Lancashire for his outstanding leadership of the school and support to me – he is a prince among men. The Advisory Council, P&F, staff, student leaders and their peers have reflected a dedication and humility in their work to progress the College. It has been inspirational. My Executive Assistants Ms Glenys Taylor and Mr George Baxas (CBC 2017) have made the world of difference to my time here. I think it's fair to say that their vocabulary has been extended and their usage thereof has been enriched.

I have been a tourist in Melbourne for 50 years – usually in footy season! The pulse and rhythm of Melbourne, its generous beauty of public buildings and spaces, its liberal outlook and evidence of welcome and consideration are qualities I have admired and been thankful for. This will continue.

As my three terms leading St Mary's College, St Kilda East, comes to a close, the contrasts between St Mary MacKillop College, Canberra celebrating 25 years this year, and St Mary's over 140 years old, are stark.

Beginning as a boys' school in 1878, conducted by the Christian Brothers, its long story reflects the great events of the development of white Australia; the post-gold rush boom, the organisation of labour, Federation, world wars and the Depression. In the progress of Catholic life, the Groupers and The

Movement and a Church transformation from an Irish transplant to our own flavour, are evident. The lifting of Catholic Melbourne from working class into the middle class, was a century of work for Australian Catholic Schools. The move to co-education completes the narrative!

This story is found in its buildings, the progress of its alumni, its publications and its changing culture and perspectives, its history is evidenced everywhere.

MacKillop Canberra was born of an unwelcome and disruptive amalgamation that was probably more about economic efficiencies than anything to do with education. The buildings are meant to last decades, not centuries. Its purpose is to offer opportunities for students to know and love Jesus and that those opportunities be offered with the integrity of a contemporary setting amidst a quality secular curriculum. MacKillop, like St Mary's, reflects and responds to the times as all successful agents of Good do.

Several years ago, the future looked certain and secure. Issues of world peace, global warming, the needs of our community, free and fair trading, need not have directly impacted on us. There was complacency for too many of us.

Suddenly and terrifyingly, all that changed with the immediacy of images and reports from Wuhan and Milan, the scarcity of vaccines and pending lock-downs concentrated our attention. Medical science, government leadership, technology and our own survival instincts got us to the other side – mostly! Who would be so foolish to believe certainty would now be part of our futures and that complacency would be anything other than what it has always been – derelict and dangerous!

And yet, there is a firm belief that education based on the values of the Gospel, on the person of the Crucified Christ and the act of Love that is His resurrection, has a place in our today and tomorrow. Values form principle and guide behaviour, therefore informing culture. The opportunity in both schools to influence young people to have choice and to make choices that are good for others as well as themselves, should not be overlooked. It is central to growing into adults purpose, substance and character as well as integrity, selfefficacy and capacity.

Whether this occurs in schools that are old and famous or that are new and emerging, Catholic schools have always and will always be places where this can happen. While ever they continue to be such places, human dignity will flourish and they will be consequential agents for the Common Good.

That's for certain!

2023 has been an eventful year for our College with a number of significant changes and initiatives occurring.

We are thankful for Terry's stewardship through St Mary's transition to a Coeducational College and for guiding us through the challenges associated with the COVID pandemic. We wish Terry all the best for the future and remind him that he will always be a valued friend of our College.

We also thank Michael Lee for taking on the role of Interim Principal, leaving for a time his Principalship of St Mary MacKillop College, Canberra's largest Catholic Coed College. Michael's experience and passion for education has been a great asset for our school during his short tenure.

Importantly a new Principal has been appointed and we will be welcoming Darren Atkinson to our College in 2024. - After much consideration and analysis we have decided to focus on the long term development of the Westbury Street Campus

- Our first project has been completed, the construction of a new stairwell and lift at the southern end of the McCartney Wing as well as some compliance work in other parts of the site.
- As a result of securing a Federal Government Grant the College has funds of approximately \$3,000,000 available for the next stage of building works. These will commence in 2024 and will be focused on the upgrade of existing Classrooms and facilities

We are already working on arranging further funds to undertake a third stage of Building Works. The St Mary's Community will begin to see and enjoy a significant improvement in our facilities in the near future.

As always' a number of thank you' s. To Shaun Lancashire, the leadership team and all our staff for their tremendous commitment to our College. To the EREA for their ongoing support. To my fellow School Advisory Council Members for their dedication to our School and our students. Finally to our students and their families, you are the reason we exist and the source of our motivation.

After 5 years as Chair and 10 years as a member of the Advisory Council I will be stepping down and John Sinisgalli will assume the role of Chair from 2024. However, I will continue to be involved in the College in one or more roles.

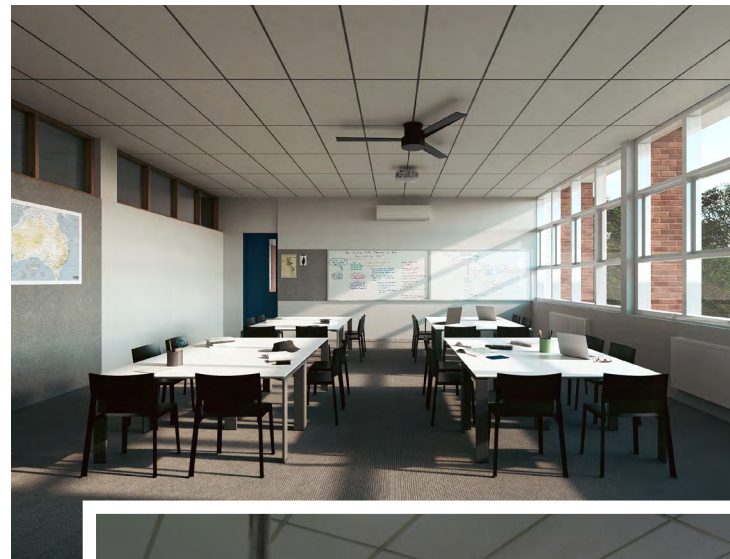

The Catholic Identity of our College is lived out on a daily basis, however during the year there are more obvious examples that come to mind.

All students begin the academic year with a whole school liturgy. A wonderful opportunity to reconnect after the Christmas break and hear again from our College Chaplain Fr Jerome Santamaria. As a whole school we also gather for Ash Wednesday to begin our Lenten period and to conclude Term 1 we gather again to recall the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ as we move into our Easter break.

All students engage with time away from normal classes, bells and homework to reflect on their place in the world and how they can contribute to building the Kingdom of God. For example a day to spend time exploring interfaith dialogue and a visit to the Islamic Museum and the Jewish Museum. Amazing Catholic women who have shaped the Catholic identity of Melbourne such as Mary Glowery and Saint Mary Mackillop. Services who support those living on the margins such as The Big Issue and the Salvation Army. And our important places of worship in Melbourne, St Patrick's Cathedral and St Francis' Church. These days allow us all to stop, reflect and recall what is important in our own lives and that of our community.

During the year we had students prepare for and receive the Sacraments of Confirmation, Reconciliation and First Communion. These were very special occasions for all involved and marked the continuation of the student's faith journey.

Our College values- Respect, Justice, Compassion, Inclusivity and Courage drive all that we do. Students embrace these as they support each other and organisations across our community. They do this through advocacy of important issues and material support by donating money, material goods and their time.

The Mandela Service Awards are awarded each year to students who serve in our community. This service is given freely and without payment. Each student is asked to serve a minimum of 67 minutes each term. Why? Because, just like Blessed Edmund Rice who served those around him in need many others also generously served in their community. COLLEGE COUNSELLOR'S REPORT

2023 has been an extremely busy year for counselling at St. Mary's College. Many students have come for support on a range of issues including low mood and depression, anxiety, friendships, school refusal, family issues, anger, stress, trauma, grief and loss, sleep, eating disorders, loneliness, social media pressures and substance use, just to name a few. The list is endless and often students are contending with more than one issue at a time.

After the knock on the door to start each session, the students have come willing to talk. Sometimes they have come in pairs and other times, on their own. Sometimes it's at lunchtimes and others, during class-time. They have come of their own volition or on the recommendation of parents or staff.

Together we have focussed on solutions which empower and enable them to take charge of their progress. Sometimes referrals have been made to Headspace, Alfred Child Youth and Mental Health Services, Berry Street or MacKillop Family Services, the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing and local governments agencies. Students have sometimes been encouraged to seek external help themselves through Kids Helpline or through Beyondblue or eheadspace for times when they are not at school or not able to avail themselves of professional support.

My work as College Counsellor has been made eminently easier through the support of the Pastoral Leaders Team and the Child

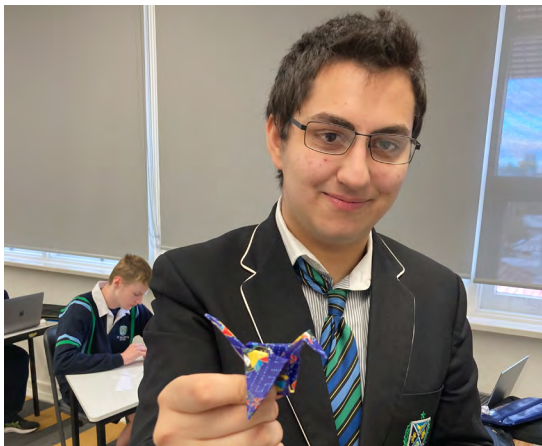
Safety Team. Through these groups, the context of each student has been explored, including how they work in class or interact with their peers. School counselling is never an isolated endeavour – you are always part of a team.

Along with face-to-face counselling, there has also been the organisation of Student Voice – a team of students charged with bringing to our attention student safety issues within and outside of the school community. This group has met every three weeks along with Chris Pye and me and is always full of energy and ideas. Student Voice has also led Bullying No Way! Day and RUOK? Day this year.

The mental health of our students is paramount at St. Mary's College, especially as students still recover from the on-going effects of lockdowns and COVID 19. Some students are still adjusting to socialising, school routines and face to face learning.

Counselling at St. Mary's College has been an absolute privilege. To meet so many students, listen to their stories and propose interventions, makes one realise that no-matter what the situation, their issues are real and impact hugely on their well-being and learning. In the end most can be addressed, and the students can move forward with their young lives.

Our students must be commended for seeking help and taking care of their mental health and well-being. May this continue well into the future.





STUDENT WELLBEING

After a year spent emerging from the fug of lockdowns, 2023 promised to be a (full) return to normal school existence. I think many of us came into the year looking for the steady drumbeat of predictability, routine and structure to underpin the entire year. There is comfort in this and, somewhat paradoxically, these inexorables allow for creativity and joy. On Welcome Day (January 31), I remember thinking that students seemed ready to embrace school again, the totality of it, the challenge it, the fun inherent in it. I wondered if my forecast would prove accurate when I came time to reflect on the year. I really hoped it would be.

Well, pleasingly, it was accurate. Our students, once again, embraced the breadth and gamut of school life. It was great to see.

This renewed sense of vigour bears out in data acquired by the College. As you know, the College has formed a partnership with an educational data service called Pulse. This allows us to check-in with students to see how they are going and to support them if they are having some difficulties. The data accrued from this process is positive. Last year, students were, on average, 80/100 for feeling healthy (sleep, exercise, co-curricular events). This year, that number moved to 83/100. Whilst a three point increase may not seem a lot, this data is generated from 3563 survey results, which clearly highlights that many of our students are feeling more energised. Further, the Pulse Team highlight that any move in data up or down two points is significant. Pleasingly, two points were also added to the category of connectedness to College life. The lockdown languor appears to have left our students, animation has replaced alienation, more students are charging at life rather than retreating from it.

These trends, of course, were evident on the ground. It seems more students put in for co-curricular activities, SRC Meetings were better attended, Student Voice Meetings were lively and impactful (okay, the pizza on offer probably helps!), assemblies were more joyful, classrooms more focused. Quite often this year, there was a real buzz around the school. This is generated from an uptick in student engagement and a general willingness for students to bring their best selves to what they are doing.

The Respectful Relationships Program was another successful part of the year. Particularly in Semester 2, lessons were rolled out fortnightly. They covered topics like: study skills, personal strengths, gender and identity, safe partying and time management. I would like to thank all Pastoral Leaders and Pastoral Teachers for their work in constructing and delivering these lessons. We were also fortunate to have a number of guest speakers come in to augment the program. At Year 7, members of the police force's educational unit came in to talk about on-line behaviours, whilst at Years 9 and 11 we had the team from Elephant Ed come in to speak about consent. The lessons constructed by Pastoral Leaders were engaging and thoughtful. The College's inclusive culture is enhanced for the program and we look forward to seeing further positive impact come from its delivery.

Part of the vision of the Pastoral Team is to create a culture where the positive attributes of our students are celebrated. The College's Commendations Structure serves this end. At Community Meetings, students received certificates and badges for good deeds done. I thank teachers for taking the time to lodge these positive actions and thank the Pastoral Leaders and Pastoral Teachers for administering the program. Above all else, it was brought joy to the community – to both students and teachers.

I would like to thank the Pastoral Leaders for their support of students this year. Whether it be a conversation about wellbeing, uniform, effort in studies, punctuality, co-curricular activities or life in general, the care and guidance exhibited by all members of the team is really commendable. I would also like to thank Ms Catherine McMahon for her wonderful work as Student Counsellor and as the leader of the Student Voice Committee. Catherine also animated RU Okay Day and Bullying No Way Day which, again, serve the pursuit of a truly inclusive school culture.

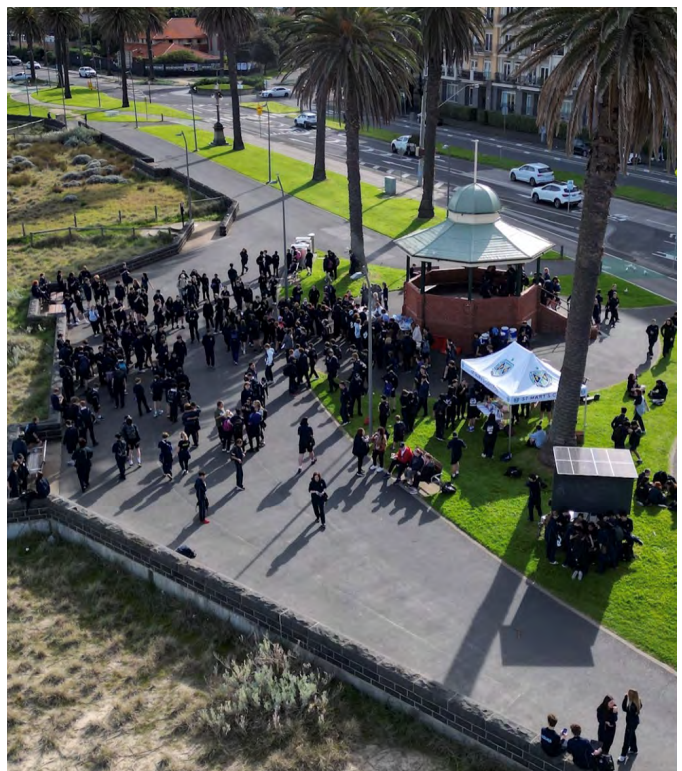
We have also had a great team of SRC Leaders this year. I thank them for their example, helpfulness and positivity were valuable to the groups they lead.

I would also like to thank parents for their support of the College. From a pastoral perspective, having clear, efficacious lines of communications with parents really supports wellbeing and behaviour. Although not every phone call, or meeting, is an easy one, the way in which these conversations go are invariably reasonable and solution focused. Often, they support growth, better decision making and the acquisition of resilience and restraint. The parent and teacher working relationship is a positive part of our school. Our students really benefit from it.

A lot has taken place since the heat and enormous blue skies of Welcome Day. I think that most of our students, when they hit the gates at the end of the day, had many good days, some great, some a bit difficult. There has been knowledge acquired, skills built, friendships discovered, successes, disappointments, challenges surmounted and small (yet great) moments on seemingly humdrum days which, for some reasons, become resonant and memorable. School really is a formative experience. When students bring their best selves to its totality, as so many of our students have done this year, they are great places where great things happen.

YEAR 12 GRADUATION

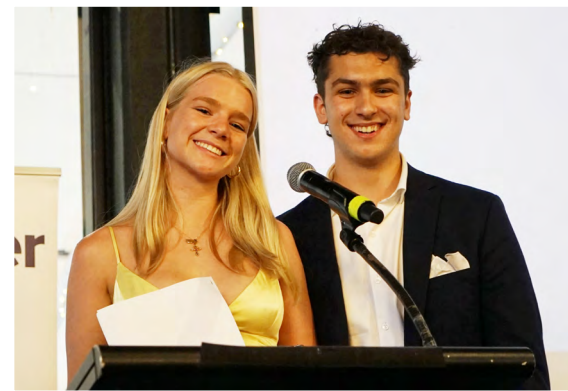
Our Year 12 Graduation evening was held on November 15th.

This year was a time of meeting challenges, exploring deeper relationships with other students and staff and consolidation of knowledge and skills.

I shared with the students the idea of comparing compulsory education to an AFL football match. Prep to Grade 3 is the first quarter, Grade 4 to 6 the second quarter, Year 7 to 9 the third quarter and Year 10 to 12 the final quarter.

It is rare for a team to win a match if they are not leading on the scoreboard at three quarter time. The third quarter is often described as the premiership quarter where the game is either won or lost.

The reasoning for sharing in this way is to counter the stress that many parents, teachers, and community members put on Year 12. Often the conversation about school takes on an urgency and a special level of importance for Year 12.

Schooling thought of in this way allows for a greater focus on Years 7, 8 and 9. Some suggest that these years of schooling, particularly

Year 9, is a time of less importance, characterised by student disengagement and lack of focus.

This year our students rafted the Mitchell River; attended the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne; dived; paddled; bowled, skated; played competitive inter school sport; played in bands; performed on stage at the musical; contributed to the Art Show; participated in Liturgy; provided mentorship to local primary school students; led parents on talk and tours of the school; experienced a retreat; immersed themselves in Indigenous culture at Lake Mungo and so much more.

Daily the class teachers engaged with the students and parents and guardians supported at home. Working together we have achieved much in 2023.

A rich, fertile, and rewarding experience has prepared our students for the challenges of working with their chosen pathway from school to the wider world beyond. As this time as school is about to enter the final quarter, I wish our Year 9 students and families a peaceful, enjoyable, and safe Christmas celebration and summer holiday.

YEAR 7

Year 7 Orientation Day 2023. I remember it being cloudy and cold. I remember seeing parents and the students gathering at Edmund Rice Campus. I remember nerves and excitement. However, most pertinently, I remember feeling a distinct sense of optimism and hope directly emanating from the group. There was just this natural ebullience to them, albeit cribbed by the gravitas of the day and the realisation of starting at secondary school. I was really looking forward to seeing them become a positive part of the College.

They started well. Term 1 saw all students attend camp at Anglesea. The reports from Mr Joyce were positive – friendships were emerging, confidence being built. These things were soon apparent back at school. Early in Term 1, when I walked out of my office, I would see pairs of students sitting and chatting. A week later, these pairs were groups. There was often laughter and general elan. It was the same story on the oval and basketball courts. Soon, games of basketball were being played, footies kicked, cricket balls hit. Every morning there was locker induced cacophony – students would wrestle with the code of their locker and rattle their locks. Initially, it wasn't a sound I found particularly agreeable. However, when they moved up to the third level of the McCartney Corridor, I began to miss this metallic discordance. Well, a bit anyway!

The focus of our Year 7 Program is cultivating a sense of belonging. The main instrument for this is the Pastoral Care Group, led by a Pastoral Teacher. This year, our Year 7 students have been fortunate to be guided and supported by a wonderful group of Pastoral Teachers. 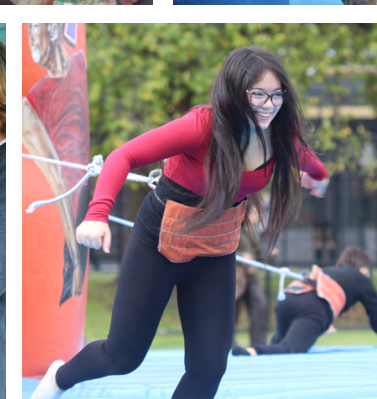
This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends... I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

It has been a good year for learning and teaching at the College. The focus on high impact teaching strategies has seen an improvement in student engagement and academic performance. Teachers have focused on using formative assessment to inform their teaching programs.

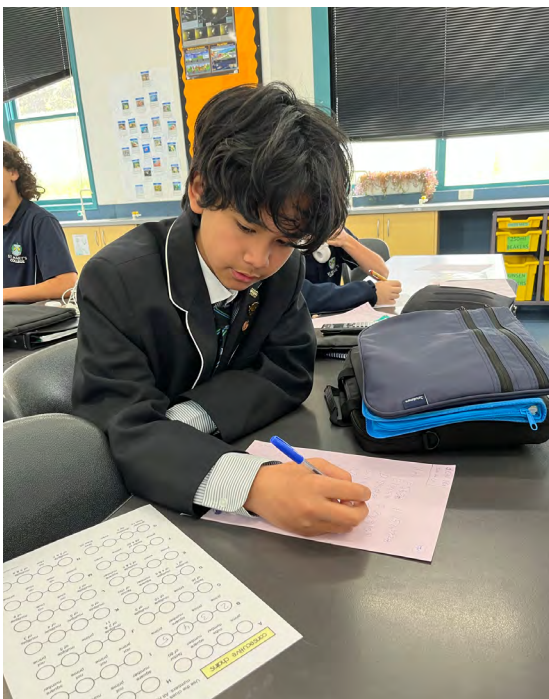
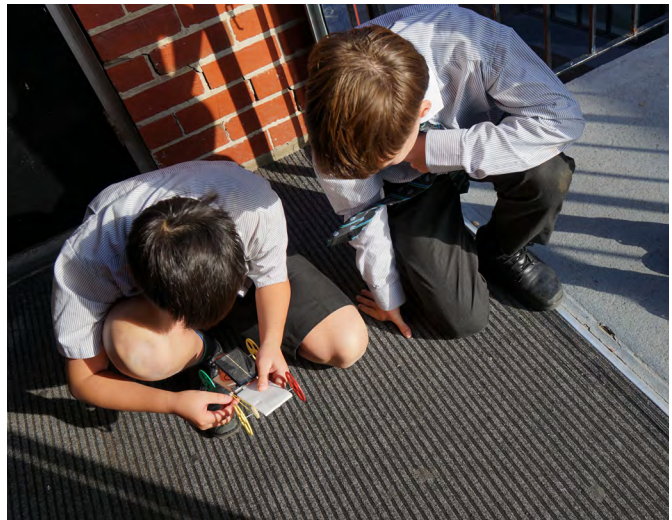
We undertook a major project to plan for students who need learning support to achieve at the same level as their peers. Together with the Learning Diversity department, we designed an Adjustment Planner that allowed teachers to intentionally plan for the diverse needs of our students. Our investigation of Mastery Learning teaching strategies has supported this endeavour.

We have been part of the disciplinary literacy project through MACS over the past two years. The project addresses the literacy demands of

the subjects offered at the College. Our focus was on the vocabulary used in the subjects. Our pilot project headed by Ms Peggy Blassis in Year 7 science showed a remarkable improvement in student understanding. She was supported by the project leader, Mr Sam Walden, and Ms Chris Sodastis. Strategies for explicitly teaching vocabulary skills were developed and other learning areas have planned to implement these next year.

We continued to focus on our strategies to improve our VCE results. Using data to track individual students progress enabled us to support them to achieve their very best.

Our team of dedicated teachers are to be congratulated for another successful academic year.

ENGLISH

SENIOR ENGLISH REPORT

THE WINDS OF CHANGE BLEW THROUGH SENIOR ENGLISH THIS YEAR. THE STUDY DESIGN CHANGED IN UNITS 1 AND 2 AND THE TEXTS WERE REPLACED IN UNITS 3 AND 4.

In unit 1 and 2 (year 11), the new innovation was ‘crafting texts’ and ‘personal response to texts’. A new text was introduced, a film, “The Hate You Give” was studied and a personal response written. This meant that the students had to give a visceral personal response to the text. The plot, characters and themes all had to be written as they affected each individual student. This was handled well by the students although they had not encountered this style of writing previously. Crafting of texts was an innovative study design that allowed students to respond creatively to stimulus on a chosen theme. The theme this year was “Trapped”. Thanks to Miss Vandrine who drove this new study design and in consultation with other staff produced much good stimulus material to which the students responded in their writing. In 2024, the year 12 English study design will change to include many of these innovations, however, our students are ready for this.

In Units 3 and 4 (year 12) English the new texts had arrived as the older texts expired. We studied the American gothic horror novel, by the infamous Shirley Jackson, “We Have Always Lived in the Castle” in which the main protagonist is a teen-age girl rebelling against the dictates of American small-town society in the early 1960s. The other new text was Trevor Noah’s “Born a Crime” which details growing up in apartheid South Africa in the 1980s and nineties. This was a creative response and many of the students excelled at this type of writing. Overall this was a successful year in senior English as the students for the most part were eager and engaged with the new material.

LITERATURE REPORT YEARS 11 & 12

THIS YEAR THE WHOLE LITERATURE STUDY DESIGN CHANGED FOR UNITS 1-4.

In year 11 literature there was more emphasis on indigenous writing with a new unit entitled “Voices of Country”. We studied the poetry of Oodgeroo Noonuccal, the novel “Follow the Rabbit Proof Fence” by Doris Pilkington and some short stories from “Growing Up Aboriginal in Australia”. This led to some highly thoughtful work from the students some of whom may not have previously encountered aboriginal voices in literature. Another new unit in the literature course was ‘literary movements’ and we chose “Gothic Literature”. Our texts were “Frankenstein” by Mary Shelley and some gothic short stories including “The Lottery” by Shirley Jackson.

In year 12, there was much more focus on close analysis with each part of the course containing an element of a close reading. The new unit this year was ‘developing interpretations’ which included students analysing literary perspectives and significant passages from Joan Lindsay’s “Picnic at Hanging Rock”.

MORRIS WEST CREATIVE WRITING AWARDS 2022 WINNERS



Morris West was an Australian novelist and playwright, best known for his novels *The Devil's Advocate* and *The Shoes of the Fisherman* (Both were adapted into films). He wrote 27 novels and sold more than 60 million copies worldwide. He was born in St Kilda and attended CBC. He

worked as a teacher in NSW and Victoria and was Prime Minister's Billy Hughes' Secretary.

The winner of the Morris West competition 2023 is Year 10 student Helena Giglas. Please enjoy her original and thought-provoking piece below.

At a young age, I discovered my unusual ability to hear and speak with others with my mind. This 'disease', called thus by my family and practitioners alike, allowed me to interact with entities that others – even you, dear reader – cannot even begin to perceive! 2023 was another amazing year in the Outdoors for St Mary's Students. Our junior program continues to thrive and Year 7, 8 and 9 students excelled in achieving key aims of promoting teamwork, building relationships, and fostering resilience. It has also been pleasing to continue our emphasis on connecting students with the environment and incorporating learning about Australian Indigenous History & Culture, providing a holistic and enriching experience.

Our year 7 coastal camps in Term 1 are always a great way to start the year and welcome new students to the College. As students join the St Mary's community they are able to build new relationships and life long friendships while also developing teamwork and resilience. Students engaged in surfing and mountain bike riding, fostering a sense of camaraderie and mutual support.

As surf conditions can be fickle we're fortunate to have our own equipment so students can have up to three surfing sessions led by experienced instructors. Other students embrace mountain bike rides through coastal trails, building skills and promoting teamwork. All students visit the Great Otway National Park to learn about Parks Victoria, park management and local Indigenous History.



The Year 8 hiking and biking camp in Term 2 is centred around developing teamwork and resilience while students visit a sub alpine environment. We learn of the history of both the Gunaikurnai people and European settlement and post war subsistence programs in the region. As always, students love whiling away time on the banks of the Avon River, skimming rocks and swimming and always enjoy a relaxed night by the fire at the Blores Hill Camping Park after the thrill of an afternoon ride at the local Mountain Bike Park. This year saw a slight change for the final camp with camp site maintenance forcing us to camp by the Channels on the Avon. Students had to be creative to pitch tents on the rocky beach but were lucky to spend extra time in such a beautiful place.

Students often ask why we move from the fun of surfing in Year 7 to challenging hiking in Year 8. This scaffolded approach is truly geared to fostering lifelong recreation and exploration. It's always great for me to hear from alumni who build on their school experiences. A few recent examples range from one exploring cities of Europe on foot to another hiking into the Grand Canyon on a US road trip and even to one of our past students hiking 2200 miles of the Appalachian Trail in the Eastern United States! Walking is a great way to stay active and healthy and see the world!

The Year 9 Mitchell River white water rafting camps in Term 3 continued to emphasise personal and social development while deepening the connection to the environment through a journey based experience. The year 9 cohort includes many students who are new to St Mary's and it was great to see them embrace the adventure and adapt to a new and unique experiential learning experience. All of the students extended their learning by planning

and cooking all of their own food, setting and packing camp each day and developing their independence.

As we travel down the Mitchell river we focus on the unique remnant rainforest of the region and spend time learning of the Gunaikurnai history of the area while visiting the Den of Nargun. A tool carving stone, cave markings and campfire smoke residue are remnants of thousands of years of life and history in the area.

Our Year 10 VET Outdoor Recreation Class had a fantastic year. Learning to be outdoor instructors and leaders their learning focussed on Workplace Safety and Camp Planning while developing skills in Surfing, Snorkelling, Navigation, Kayaking and Mountain Bike Riding. Two Camps and day trips provided a great opportunity to break up classroom learning and develop key skills and experience on the course. Tomasz Tamowicz led the class all year and finished all written assessment tasks in record time!

2023 also saw bumper sell out crowds on our St Mary's College Ski Trips and a record number of students take on the challenge of the Great Victorian Bike Ride at the end of the school year. It has been great to continue extending students in the post covid world and continue to re-engage them in both positive recreation and connecting to nature. Integrating lessons on Australian Indigenous history and emphasizing a connection to the environment has enriched overall experiences and positive outcomes demonstrate the success of the program in nurturing personal growth and holistic development among the students. The school looks forward to continuing this enriching tradition in the future.





ST MARY'S COLLEGE SKI TRIPS

Just as Taylor Swift thought she had the hottest tickets in town the St Mary's College Ski Trip bookings opened. TryBooking was so inundated that it crashed 15 minutes in! The system reset and tickets were sold out 40 minutes later!

Forty Eight St Mary's College students were able to catch the end of Victoria's Snow Season over two ski weekends this year, including twenty three first timers. Each day kicks off with an early start for 8:30 lessons before an afternoon of free skiing on Mount Buller. The Year 12s on the first trip had thick fog but great snow on southern slopes with 'Wombat', 'Little Buller Spur' and 'Standard' providing great skiing. Advanced senior skiers were able to cap off the weekend with a run off the summit down 'Slalom Gully'. Younger students on the second trip were blessed with spectacular blue skies but the early onset of Spring saw diminishing snow. Great skiing was still to be had though as 'Family Run', 'Summit' and 'Howqua' delivered.

We must mention some highlights of the year as students young and old took to the slopes. It was great to have some experienced young skiers out including Charlie, Christian, Leroy and Charlie S. It was also fantastic to have a new group of Year 9 girls with Yesenia, Georgia and Jaya joining us. With some younger students on board I need to thank Yasmin, Nick and Gus for looking after them and Arthur for his extraordinary support of some first timers. And lastly a special mention to Dana who took to skiing an advanced black run on her second day of skiing- it was great to see her ice skating skills come to the fore and translate on to snow!





2023 GREAT VICTORIAN BIKE RIDE

Twenty One brave St Mary's students signed up for the Great Victorian Bike Ride this year. Six were back on after having a great time last year but for most this was a new and exciting experience. Training rides kicked off in term four as we rode along local paths and the beach, gradually building up to over 50km along beach road. But nothing could prepare us for the main event....

It rained the whole drive out to Orbost. Following a trailer malfunction (no key for the lock!!!) our students set up surrounded by hundreds of other school students from 13 schools. The 2023 GVBR would see nearly 900 students take part with over 3000 riders overall. On day 2 (the first ride day), as the convoy rolled out of Orbost and began the slow climb to Buchan, the rain began again. With wet clothing and gear students got creative and using bikes and tent ropes as clothes lines to reset for ride to Lakes Entrance. The second ride day saw glorious sun and spirits rise- an afternoon swim and fish & chips was a great way to cap off the day. Mr Paul headed home and Mr Joyce took the reins to lead the group for the rest of the week.

The third ride day across to Paynesville was clear but the clouds were building. With camp set we settled in. So did the rain. This would continue for the next five days and resilience was the only key to success. The fourth ride day saw strong rain and wind and the Victorian Police unit on the event made the safe decision to keep school students safe and off the road. Bicycle Network Victoria event organisers kicked into overdrive, sourcing busses and trucks to transport 2000 riders and bikes across to Sale while only the hardy mounted up for the 80km ride. We sat high and dry in the Football and Lawn Bowls club rooms before being bussed to Sale to set up camp and relax in the event marquee. A few students headed home to escape the weather but 17 carried on and settled in to take on the second half of the event.



LEARNING

Our rest day in Sale was a chance to catch a movie and hang out at the laundromat drying clothes! Though the rain continued the rest and reset helped to steel our resolve for the final days. We were now experts and keeping dry and warm. It was great to be back on the bike on day 7 as the ride rolled from Sale to Yarram. Our junior students were on the road first each day, followed by older groups departing camp a half hour later. Staff brought up the rear to guide students home. This was the peak of the week as riders took on 102km. The route was flat though and we were all in at camp in the early afternoon and enjoying the local sausage sizzle.

There were some nerves in Yarram as the incoming tide met high river levels and our day 8 route was blocked. Thankfully the tide dropped overnight and we were able to continue with the planned ride. Rain continued as riders climbed the southern slopes of the Strzelecki ranges before flying downhill to the lunch stop at Toora. The chill had set in by this stage and a hot snack provided by the local community was just the ticket to help riders knock off the final kilometres.

As we set up and settled in at the final camp in Fish Creek the rain finally eased and stopped. A sigh of relief spread over the riders and staff and was accompanied by a sense of accomplishment- we had survived days of rain and only had one more night and one day of riding left! As night fell the evening entertainment hit the stage. Tables were cleared as a band played classics for hours and the dancefloor heaved! The camp was full of joy and energy and no one wanted to go to bed as the football ground lights went out.

The final day was special- the sky was a new colour; blue and clear! Students got away early and a relatively flat route wound down to the coast at Inverloch before the final 20km to Wonthaggi. At the finish line we didn't know whether to shelter from the sun or bask in it. Seventeen of our students, 3 parents and a group of staff persisted to complete the 2023 GVBR. 500km of riding, persistent rain, camp ground fun, entertainment, a huge mix of healthy (and some extra unhealthy) food, resilience, persistence and fortitude all came together to cap off a Week in Another World. Our students have an extraordinary sense of achievement and there is already talk of signing on again!





LANGUAGES

The advantages of learning foreign languages are as compelling as ever. As the world becomes increasingly globalised, bilingualism is now perhaps one of the most useful real-world skills, rather than just being something handy when overseas. Becoming a polyglot is a possibility for every individual, all that is required is the right approach and mindset.

Seeing our students develop their language skills from Year 7 to 12 is extremely satisfying and it provides many of our students with the ability to use language effectively in a variety of situations.

LEARNING



VISUAL & PERFORMING ARTS

2023 was another highly productive year in VAPA for St Mary's College students. Students across all year levels had the opportunity to explore their creativity and to develop skills in Art, Visual Communication Design and Media.

Guided by Ms Lopez, Year 7 Art students were introduced to the elements and principles of Art and applied these in the creation of a mixed media poster. Students experimented with a range of mediums and developed their skills in observational drawing through sketching the human hand. Contour drawing with an emphasis on; line, tone and capturing form were key aspects of the task as students explored monochromatic and achromatic compositions in their work.

Year 8 students further developed their drawing and mark making techniques through an exploration of the natural landscape. Colour, tonal variation and brushwork allowed students to explore shape, form, space and perspective in their work. At Year 10 level students continued to develop Art analysis skills through a study of the Still Life painting techniques of the artist Wayne Thiebaud. Students then completed a number of studies related to colour and painting technique prior to producing an acrylic painting of a cake on canvas. As students progress into Year 11, it is highly evident that through their junior years they have built up the necessary techniques and knowledge that allow them to have the confidence to be more independent with their Art Making.

2023 saw the introduction of the new Art Making and Exhibiting study design for VCE students. Year 11 students researched art movements and completed studies related to Impressionism, Surrealism and Cubism. One highlight of our year was our excursion to Ripponlea Estate where students completed plein-air painting. Another opportunity to look beyond the classroom for inspiration was our excursion to Federation Square where we viewed the Melbourne Now Exhibition and students engaged with the contemporary practice of Melbourne artists. Throughout the year students explored various themes of personal interest including Architecture and the urban environment, personal observations, nostalgia, travel and street art. A range of art forms were trialled as students experimented with mixed media, painting, drawing with inks and pastels and print making techniques.

In Year 12 Art Making and Exhibiting, there was an emphasis on curating and conservation. Students visited the China – The Past is Present exhibition and Top Arts to gain inspiration and to understand how an exhibition is constructed. Through their own artmaking students explored a broad range of themes including; memory, stages of grief, nostalgia, abstraction, the Australian outback and concepts of beauty. These were interpreted through model making, mixed media montages, acrylic painting on canvas and ink and charcoal drawings. All work was rigorously explored and documented to develop meaning, through the use of a Visual Arts Journal. Pleasingly there was a high level of support for each other amongst the cohort and it was evident that they developed strong bonds through the shared experience of art making.

In 2023 we welcomed Xavier Lawlor to the College who took on both the Media and Visual Design subject areas. Xavier quickly developed a strong rapport with students. His knowledge of film, camera technique and curriculum were an asset to the students. At junior level Xavier guided students through the subject Visual Design which enabled them to develop introductory skills in both Visual Communication Design and in Media. Hand drawing and digital design techniques were emphasised at Year 8 level as students experimented with creating a logo, bumper sticker and flag designs. These design tasks helped them to develop their technical skills and understanding of composition through the application of design elements and principles.

At Year 9 students created a film poster that further enabled them to develop their communication design skills. Students developed their 2D and 3D drawing skills, using both manual techniques and digital programs such as Adobe Illustrator. At Year 10 students continued to refine their 2D and 3D drawing skills as they followed a design brief to present a range of tasks relating to a fast-food client brief.

In VCE Media Xavier introduced students to the study of narrative and developments in the modern media landscape. Students were able to explore their creativity and



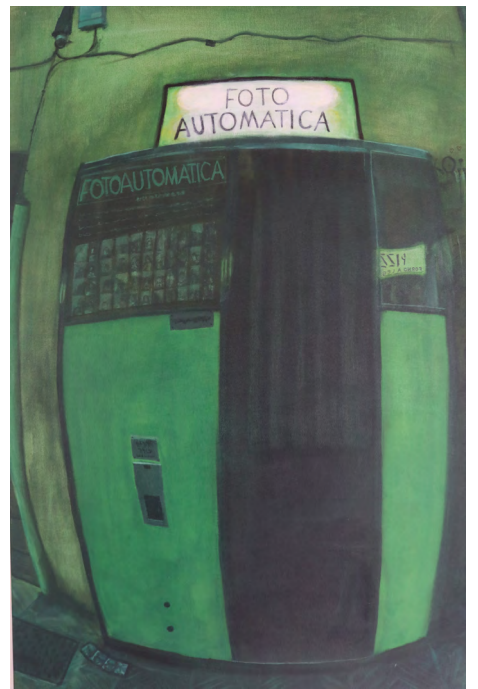
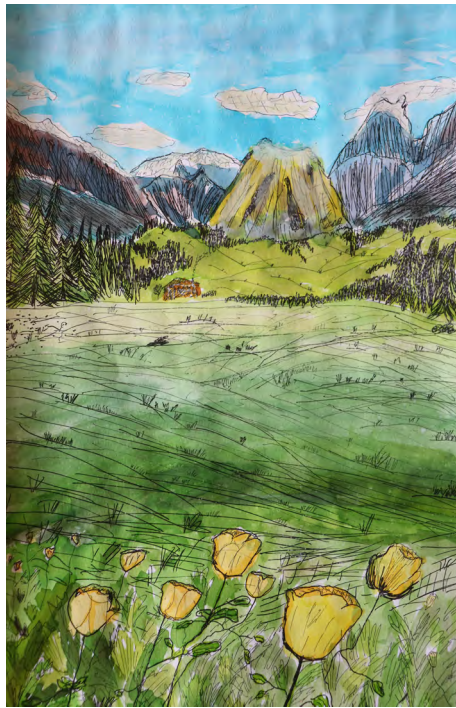

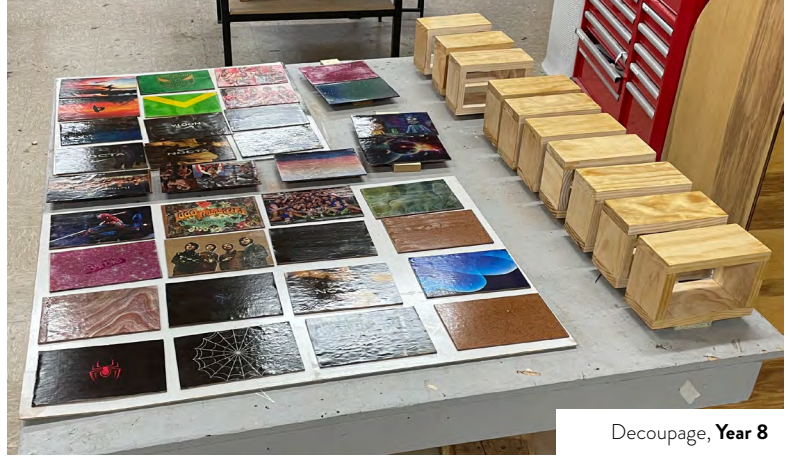
playing games which in the end directs into the skills you need to learn, a win-win for the students and for Mr. Tollit.

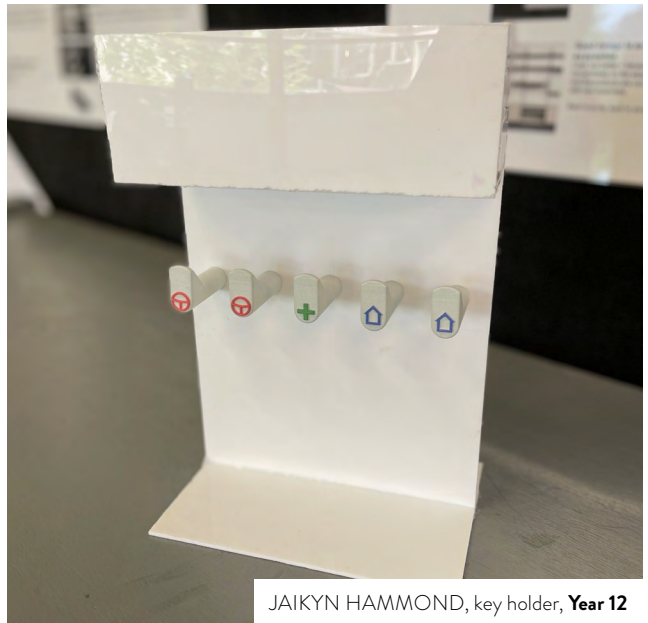

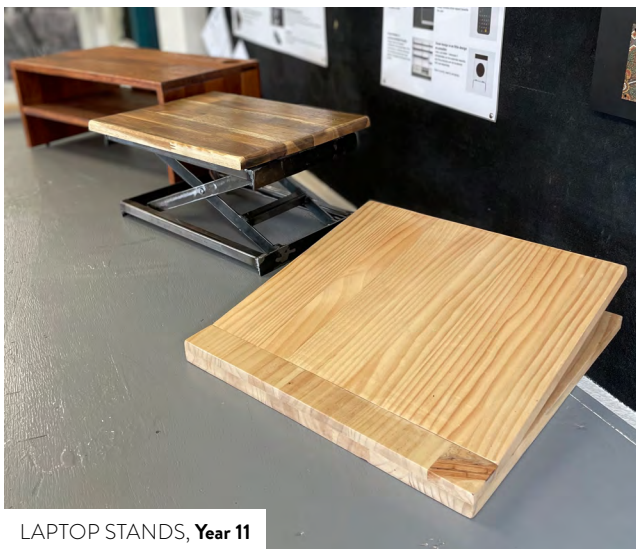

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

With an ever-growing interest in applied learning the first year of the new Vocational Major VCE pathway was an outstanding success. Having developed from the previous VCAL program, our students in the VM VCE course have demonstrated exceptional growth both personally as well as by contributing to the school community more broadly. Our large year 12 cohort group undertook some amazing opportunities both at school as well as through their work placement and VET providers and our year 11 group ended the year strongly. The year 11 Students were able to reflect on their school community and gave back to those that have been a help to them through this journey

completing projects which demonstrated their gratitude. Students had several days out in the community through our Enrichment Days and were able to focus and meet the more rigorous academic requirements of the restructured VM certificate course. There was an increased focus on developing this course for all students to be involved, we have had more girls than we have had previously and have become school leaders in developing work ethic, school culture, pride and inclusivity. Students have taken ownership of their space and classroom environments and understood how to become a functional team in line with what a future work force pathway would require of them.

LEARNING DIVERSITY

This statement from the NCCD portal sums up the role of Learning Diversity at St Mary’s College. We provide programs for students who require extra assistance to access their learning. We help teachers differentiate their lessons and class tasks, so that all students can achieve success, regardless of their level of ability. We also liaise with families to learn about the individual needs of students who experience difficulties with their learning for a wide range of reasons.

This year, a major focus of our work has been the implementation of adjustment planners. These are created for students who are supported Learning Diversity. Teachers record adjustments they will put in place for students dependent upon their individual learning profile. They are regularly reviewed to reflect changes required, according to each student’s progress in specific subject areas. The planners are informed by, and in turn

inform, the development of Personal Learning Plans (PLPs). PLPs are created in consultation with families and students as part of our ongoing partnership in which we work together in the best interests of the child.

None of this work can be done without the dedicated efforts of the Learning Diversity Team. Our Learning Support Officers and Learning Diversity Teachers work tirelessly to ensure each student in their care feels known, understood, and listened to. Whether it be in general classroom support, Guided and Supervised Study lessons, lunchtime tutoring sessions, or in Special Provisions assessment settings, these staff are committed to providing positive learning experiences for the students in their care. The Learning Diversity Team have a passion for their work and find no greater reward than helping students engage in learning and reach their potential, whatever that may mean for each individual.

Thanks to all who have worked tirelessly throughout the year to make a difference for our students: parents, teachers, and support staff. Congratulations to the students for persevering and striving for success.

FINN DAVIS & GED GIBNEY STAR AT ACC ATHLETICS 2023

On Thursday 23rd February at Lakeside Stadium Finn Davis starred in the under 16 high jump with a massive leap of 1.87m. 1.85m had been achieved on three previous occasions, by Roy Hughson in 1996, Chris Sylvio in 2002 and James Shirley in 2004 and Finn cleared this on his second attempt and raised the bar to 1.87 which he cleared on his third and final attempt. For a school with a 145-year history, records are extremely hard to come by and I imagine that this record will last for many years to come.

Ged Gibney is proving to be one of the best middle-distance runners to go through the college for many years. He won both the under 16 800m and 1500m in very fast times, the fastest for the college since Nick Smith in 2013.

Joel Farrar, another member of this extremely talented under 16 team won the discus with a very good throw of 27.53m and Will Stone was third in both the under 16 100m and 200m.

Other highlights were the senior 4x100m relay in which Liam Denys, Harley Shuurman, Lefteri Drossos and Rook Barry ran an outstanding 46.57 and the senior 4x400m relay where Liam and Harley were joined by Broadie Leeds and Tom Seeliger ran a most impressive 3mins and 50 seconds for second place. Hugo Speldewinde leapt an amazing 12.06 to win the under 17 triple jump. This was just 29cm short of the record set in 1991, (Paphakone Manikhot) and equalled in 2002 (Huy Do). Sam Scharper threw the 3kg shot a massive 10.20m for second place in the under 14 shot put. Well done everyone!

LAKE MUNGO

In August this year, students in Year 9 and 10 students travelled more than 130 km to explore over 40,000 years of history at Lake Mungo. Home to Mungo Man and Mungo Lady – the oldest human remains ever found in Australia. They also had the opportunity to delve into the deep spiritual connections of the Barkindji, Muthi Muthi, and Nyampar people have to the Willandra Lakes region.

This exciting 6-day immersion takes in a few days on Country on the banks of the Murray River and then groups head East to Mungo National Park to explore the park from Indigenous, spiritual, historical, and scientific lenses with Vicki Clarke OAM and the National Park Indigenous Rangers.

Students experienced:

- Learning about the ancient fish traps
- Making traditional woven crafts
- Foraging for and trying unique native bush tucker
- Fishing for dinner (or a bit of fun) in the river
- Exploring Culpra Milli's ancient trees, fireplaces, and stories
- Opportunities to understand the history of Culpra Milli and the Pearce family journey to claim Native Title.

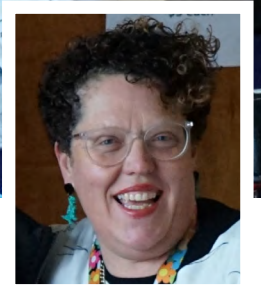
The days at Mungo National Park included:

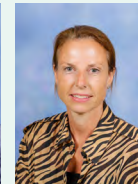
